
Practice with Purpose: Literacy Work Stations for Grades 3-6 by Debbie Diller

If you are thinking of organizing and utilizing Literacy Stations in the intermediate/upper grades then this book is a must read. The book is jammed packed with step-by-step instructions to get you started and also explains how to establish routines and manage the stations, utilize easily accessible materials, assessment and troubleshooting, and is filled with excellent ideas to use at the literacy stations.

Debbie begins by explaining the purpose and value of Literacy Stations in grades 3-6. We know they work so wonderfully in grades P-3 and she will convince you they will work just as well in the per

grades. In addition, Debbie dedicates individual chapters based on each of the literacy stations and offers great visuals and charts. All of the ideas have come from classrooms in which Debbie visited or worked.

Whether you want one literacy station or multi literacy stations, this professional book is an easy read that will get you excited and anxious to begin.

Writing Anchors by Jan Wells/Janine Reid

This professional book is an excellent resource for grades 2-7. If you are looking for a book to read about improving your writing program and using lessons on *writing anchors*, then this book is a must read.

The book begins with suggestions for establishing writing workshops and routines and the importance of teaching anchor lessons. The authors discuss writing in the four major genres: personal recounts, writing nonfiction, poetry, narrative; also included is a chapter on the use of readalouds to motivate young authors. Each genre has a writing profile, a rubric for assessment, a list of the anchor lessons for that genre and a list of the skills focus. Also included with each genre are blackline masters/graphic organizers and a wealth

of visual charts and supports. The anchor lessons are designed to help students unlock their personal voice. I liked the way the anchor lessons are part of the year-long writing program and are each focused on a particular skill that is easily incorporated in the daily writing program. Each anchor lesson begins with the purpose clearly stated, how to do it, student reflections and evaluation.
